30	KENNY BRITT	This guy could be a challenge to the coaching staff, but if anyone can take on the challenge it is JEFF FISHER. BRITT has T.O. potential and skills, but never sustained his excellence for even a full season at Rutgers. On paper he is well worth a late R1 selection. Now the challenge is to get more from him than they did from KEVIN DYSON, over his career in Nashville.	WR	6'3	218	RUTGERS
62	SEN'DERRICK MARKS	He has incredible quickness and penetration skills. His specialty is inside pass-rush, which is hard to find in a player. But his size precludes him from being a fulltime game changer. He should be a valuable piece in the rotation system attempt to fill FAT ALBERT's shoes.	DT	6'2	300	AUBURN
89	JARED COOK	COOK is a converted WR who shows great downfield receiving skills and not much as an in-line blocker. So once again we have a nice Value Pick who is a role player, not a Pro Bowler. If he can gain 10 lbs and show some want-to he could become that all-around TE. Good selection at this Pick.	TE	6'5	245	SOUTH CAROLINA
94	RYAN MOUTON	He has some value, but is more of a numbers guy than a complete player at this time. His speed is very impressive and his ball skills seem good. But at his size and with his overall game I think this is a reach of about 2 Rounds.	CB	5'10	180	HAWAII
130	GERALD McRATH	The only question with this highly athletic, and productive college LB is where to play him with his thin/wiry frame in the NFL game. It may take a year or two on Special Teams and in the weight room. He has potential to be a difference maker.	LB	6'2	230	SOTHERN MISS
135	TROY KROPOG	I like this selection. He should be good value for the Fourth Round. He lost some glitter with a week of struggles in Mobile. But as he pointed out to me that week, he had not had pads on since November because Tulane had no Bowl Game. He has the potential to eventually replace STEWART when he hits UFA time. 173	JAVON RINGER	This is a solid Pick for the TITANS and a good fit for RINGER. JAVON was a better college player than he will ever be in the NFL. But he can fit as a third option and part time injury fill-in. His work ethic and functional strength should work well for him in his efforts to stick in the NFL. Good value here. 203	JASON McCOURTY	He was a solid 3-year starter for Rutgers, and he demonstrated good speed and athleticism at his Pro Day. He also possesses good size for the CB position. He should be able to contribute on Special Teams and have Nickel/Dime package value with time.	CB	6'0	195	RUTGERS
206	DOMINIGUE EDISON	You have to believe they will hope to hide him on their Practice Squad this year because of his small school rawness. But he has the size/speed numbers that get your attention. 239	RYAN DURAND	A decent football player, with good size who got buried on a really bad football team. He has the strength and desire to perhaps develop into a decent back-up OL who can back up all along the line. Nice upside potential in R7.	OG	6'5	305	SYRACUSE
242	NICK SCHOMMER	I'd like to make a meaningful comment on his selection, but I had never heard of him going into the DRAFT. I am guessing their Draft Board was empty and he had caught a regional Scout's eye. Consider him a roster filler/RFA until further notice.	S	6'0	200	N DAKOTA STATE

An average, but unspectacular DRAFT, which is typical for the TITANS. They basically have provided themselves with some weapons to plug in at different places to upgrade the overall roster. Other than BRITT it is doubtful anyone else has the potential to ever go to a Pro Bowl. But, when you Draft at the 30th slot it's unlikely too many stars will fall into your lap. This is an average group, and the + on their grade is for Drafting guys who fit their schemes and needs. The good thing is that FISHER and his staff will get value and usefulness from most of these guys over the next couple of years.
